

Softball Uniform Packages for Teams, Style, Comfort, Performance

A great first impression starts with the uniform. Pants should sit securely at the waist and have room through the thigh for running and sliding, with reinforced knees if your players slide often. Offering a few fit options, such as regular and athletic cuts, helps players choose what feels best. Always order a few sample pieces in different sizes to test before committing to a full roster order. Sizing charts can vary by brand, so measure players rather than guessing sizes from previous seasons.

Design and branding: look good, stand out

Numbers, names, and logos: options and durability

If you plan to change rosters or reuse jerseys across seasons, choose heat-applied or embroidered names and numbers that can be replaced without swapping whole jerseys. Embroidery is durable but raises cost and weight slightly. Heat-applied vinyl is cheaper and can still look sharp, though it may show wear sooner. For long runs of identical designs, sublimation locks graphics into the fabric itself so there's no cracking or fading. Think about where you want sponsor logos placed and make sure they're sized to be readable from the stands.

Performance features to consider
